

#### A YEAR OF PROGRESS, RESILIENCE, AND IMPACT

### MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND BOARD PRESIDENT

As we reflect on 2024, we take immense pride in the strides ABLE2 has made in strengthening our programs, deepening community engagement, and laying the groundwork for sustainable growth. This year was not without its challenges, but through innovation, collaboration, and unwavering commitment, we continued to empower individuals with disabilities and their families. The progress we have achieved would not have been possible without the support of our dedicated staff, volunteers, donors, and community partners.

#### **Building a Stronger Organization**

At the heart of ABLE2 is a **dedicated and passionate team**, and this year, we prioritized staff well-being, retention, and professional development. We transitioned to a **new benefits provider**, securing better coverage with locked-in rates for the next two years, thus ensuring our employees receive the support they deserve. Recognizing the importance of equitable service delivery, we implemented a **French Language Service Policy**, expanding our ability to serve Francophone clients. We also reinforced our **commitment to inclusion** by strengthening our **Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) policies**, with training set to launch in 2025. Additionally, we developed an **Emergency Succession Plan**, ensuring continuity and stability in leadership, which is now set for Board approval.

#### **Transforming Services & Expanding Reach**

In 2024, we strengthened our commitment to service excellence by expanding programs and improving accessibility to critical resources. To **enhance access to justice**, we applied for grants to **support Francophone individuals with disabilities** navigating the legal system. We also submitted a proposal to The Law Foundation of Ontario to **sustain our Legal Referral Services Program** and develop a **plain-language legal resource library**, making legal information more accessible.

To provide greater financial support, we **secured funding to grow the Connect Program** and expanded resources for families impacted by **Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD)**. Recognizing the crucial role of volunteers, we introduced a **Volunteer Coordinator**, streamlining the onboarding process and strengthening engagement to support our growing network of Allies and program participants.

#### Sustaining Our Mission: Fundraising & Financial Growth

Financial sustainability remains a top priority, and this year, we took deliberate steps to **increase funding** and strengthen ABLE2's financial resilience. With expert guidance, we developed a four-year fundraising roadmap, positioning the organization for long-term growth.

Our Giving Tuesday and End-of-Year Campaigns demonstrated the power of community, raising an incredible **\$57,752.02** despite the financial climate, inflation threats, and other funding challenges. At ABLE2, we value **transparency and keeping our supporters engaged**, which is why we openly shared the financial struggles the organization has been facing. As we navigated the labour disputes at Canada Post, we strategically **leveraged our online platforms** to reach donors effectively—an approach that proved successful, with **94% of donations received online**. This campaign reinforced the growing impact of digital giving and the unwavering generosity of our community.

We introduced a **new grant funding strategy**, where we identified and pursued funding opportunities that align with ABLE2's mission and vision, to ensure the continued success of our programs.

The **2024 Evening in the Maritimes Gala** was another resounding success, bringing together **539 attendees**, fostering new connections, and featuring great prizes for our auctions and raffle that helped raise vital funds. Planning for the 2025 event is already underway, with key sponsors and prizes secured, setting the stage for another remarkable year.

#### Bringing People Together: Community Engagement & Events

One of ABLE2's greatest strengths is the **sense of community we foster**, and this year, we brought people together through **meaningful and inclusive events**:

- Volunteer Appreciation Event Hosted at the Museum of Science & Technology, recognizing the incredible contributions of our volunteers and their families.
- Annual Picnic Despite unpredictable weather, 61 attendees came together for a day of food, games, and music, proving the resilience of our community.
- FASD Awareness Roundtable A critical discussion that united key stakeholders to address justice system barriers for youth with FASD.
- Annual Holiday Dinner & Dance A joyful celebration at the Hellenic Centre, featuring music, sing-alongs, and a night of togetherness.

#### **Amplifying Our Voice: Communications &** Outreach

In 2024, we strengthened ABLE2's presence as a thought leader in the disability community, expanding our outreach, deepening our connection with supporters and amplifying the advocacy efforts of people with disabilities. Our digital engagement grew significantly through videos, impact storytelling, and thought leadership articles. We also revamped our website and newsletters, improving accessibility and content to ensure consistent communication with our members, donors, and stakeholders. By publishing monthly blogs on trending disability topics, ABLE2 has added to the voices of people with disabilities, shedding light on overlooked realities and barriers to inclusion, as well as recognizing their invaluable contributions to our community.



#### **Strengthening Organizational Infrastructure**

A strong foundation is essential for long-term impact, and this year, we took strategic steps to enhance our operational capacity. In April 2024, we launched a new database system, streamlining data management across all programs. We also partnered with MCCSS to complete an organizational risk assessment, earning a low-risk rating, reinforcing ABLE2's operational soundness.

Additionally, we completed a Red Cross-funded project focused on integrating DEIB principles into our volunteer programs, ensuring that inclusivity remains at the core of our engagement efforts.

#### **Looking Ahead**

As we move into 2025, we remain steadfast in our mission to expand our impact, strengthen financial sustainability, and continue advocating for a truly inclusive community. The progress we have made would not have been possible without the dedication of our Board, staff, volunteers, funders, donors, and community allies.

Every milestone we have achieved this year reflects your generosity, commitment, and belief in our mission. Together, we are building a community where everyone—regardless of ability—is seen as able, important, and valued.

In 2019, Nicole was looking for opportunities to make a meaningful impact in her community. She came across ABLE2's Matching Program and was drawn to the model of having a supportive one-on-one connection with a person with disability. She was first matched with Haneen, whose goals included improving her English and pursuing an education in Canada. From the moment they met, Nicole's purpose became clear, and their connection blossomed into a meaningful friendship.

Seeing how this relationship had positively impacted Haneen's life, her sister Sara asked if she could also have a Match with similar goals in mind. Nicole wholeheartedly took her on as her second Friend and has since then built a strong bond with the sisters.

The trio began meeting weekly at the local library and coffee shops, dedicating time to practicing their English and sharing stories. We often hear about language being a barrier, but in Nicole, Haneen, and Sara's case, their strong connection goes beyond words. With patience, creativity, and understanding, Nicole has helped improve Haneen's and Sara's English and social skills. With a smile, Sara would proudly say, "I'm no longer shy!" Both sisters have also felt empowered to pursue an education and explore employment, all while adapting to their new lives in Canada.

#### NICOLE, HANEEN AND SARA: A CONNECTION BEYOND LANGUAGE BARRIERS

Nicole's impact extended beyond just the sisters; she became a friend to their whole family, providing advice, encouragement, and above all, a sense of belonging. In a time when immigrant families face an evolving landscape, particularly in education and job access, Nicole's impact on Haneen and Sara's family has been transformative. She has provided support for the family members' goals, empowering them to thrive in a new country. The family, full of gratitude, describes her simply: "Nicole is friend, family, she is nice, good, fun. A godsend— mashallah." Nicole has truly made a difference for Haneen, Sara and their family.

As Nicole prepares to leave the country for a new work opportunity, she is determined to keep her bond with Haneen and Sara strong. Through ABLE2's Connect Program, she will continue meeting virtually with the sisters as they grow, learn and navigate life in Canada. Nicole's commitment to remain a steadfast friend and Ally shows the lasting, positive impact that dedicated volunteers have on the lives of the people with disabilities we support.

ABLE2's Matching Program isn't just about making new friends—it's about life-changing relationships that foster growth, confidence and empowerment. These bonds create ripple effects that impact families and communities, made possible thanks to the generosity and kindness of our donors, volunteers, and supporters.

# MARK'S EMPOWERING JOURNEY WITH ABLE2 REDEFINES WHAT'S POSSIBLE

"What can't Mark do?" is something you often hear from those who know him. With an energy both infectious and inspiring, Mark's achievements have defied expectations. From writing a book and starting a business to volunteering and advocating in the community, Mark has spent his life pursuing his passions and making an impact. "I want to make something of my own to be the person I want to be," he says, with characteristic determination.

When he first walked through the doors of ABLE2 in 2015, formerly Citizen Advocacy, he immediately knew he found something special. "Wow, I'm home for life. This organization feels like family," he said— a declaration that would mark the beginning of his transformative journey. He signed up for ABLE2's Matching Program, which pairs individuals with disabilities with volunteers to build long-term friendships. Mark has had four matches over the years, and he shares that his Allies have helped broaden his experiences, gain new skills, increase his self-confidence, and have a more positive outlook in life. When asked why he feels the need for a volunteer Ally since he's already accomplishing so much on his own, his answer is simple: "Because of loneliness. My current Ally is Daniel, and I feel like he's my brother. I would be lost without him. He's the best thing that's ever happened in my life; it's all I could ever ask for."

Over the years, he's done everything from volunteering at ABLE2's events, running 2k and 5k marathons at the Ottawa Race Weekend in support of ABLE2, and enthusiastically contributing to fundraising efforts. He is also an active member of the Consumer Advisory Committee (CAC) which provides insights to the Board, representing the best interests of people with disabilities. Mark has always been eager to give back to the community through an organization that he believes in. "If it was not for ABLE2, I wouldn't be where I am today. ABLE2 has made a difference in my life," shares Mark.

## IMPACTING LIVES THROUGH VOLUNTEERISM

From fostering lifelong friendships in the Matching Program to providing pro bono legal support, planning major events like Evening in the Maritimes, and guiding our organization's strategic direction in the Board of Directors, our volunteers are the driving force behind ABLE2's success. ABLE2 was also able to strengthen its volunteer engagement through a Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) lens, thanks to funding from the Government of Canada's Community Services Recovery Fund through the Canadian Red Cross. We implemented a more structured volunteer recruitment process, introduced mandatory DEIB training for all volunteers, and updated internal resources to ensure inclusivity is embedded in everything we do. These initiatives empower our volunteers with the tools and knowledge to better support people with disabilities, making their contributions even more meaningful.

#### ARNE: VOLUNTEER TURNED LIFE-LONG FRIEND

In 1985, when Arne saw an ad in the paper calling for volunteers to be a friend to an individual with disabilities in the community, he said to himself "I can do that." ABLE2, then known as Citizen Advocacy of Ottawa, matched him with Norman, a person with a disability who shared similar interests with him. Who knew that that journey would last nearly four decades, showcasing the profound impact one dedicated volunteer can have on another's life? Arne, now ABLE2's longest-serving volunteer, has not only been a steadfast advocate and Ally to his Friend Norm but also a friend he can rely on and stand with through life's challenges.

Their friendship started with a simple offer: "You can call me anytime you need to talk," Arne told Norman. It was an open invitation that laid the foundation for a bond built on trust and understanding. Through the years, Arne offered much more than friendship; he opened the door for Norm to engage in the community, create connections and relationships, and embrace life beyond the confines of his home.

Despite the challenges, especially through the pandemic, Arne was steadfast in his commitment to his friend. He continued to check in on him, reminding him of the importance of staying active and engaged. Arne's reflection on their relationship reveals a deep appreciation for the inspiration that Norman is to him and a profound appreciation of their bond. "Norman is a fantastic person. He did volunteer work too. When I met him, he wanted to do a couple of things... He wanted to leave his parents' place, he wanted to find a place of his own, he wanted to work... And he achieved most of it. Norman is the kindest person you can imagine."

When asked why he continues to be a volunteer Ally with ABLE2, Arne says: "It's very easy. Volunteers don't have to change their life. They can continue living the way they do. They don't have to work in a miracle, either. They just need to be a friend. And that's something we all need, and most of us can be friends."
